

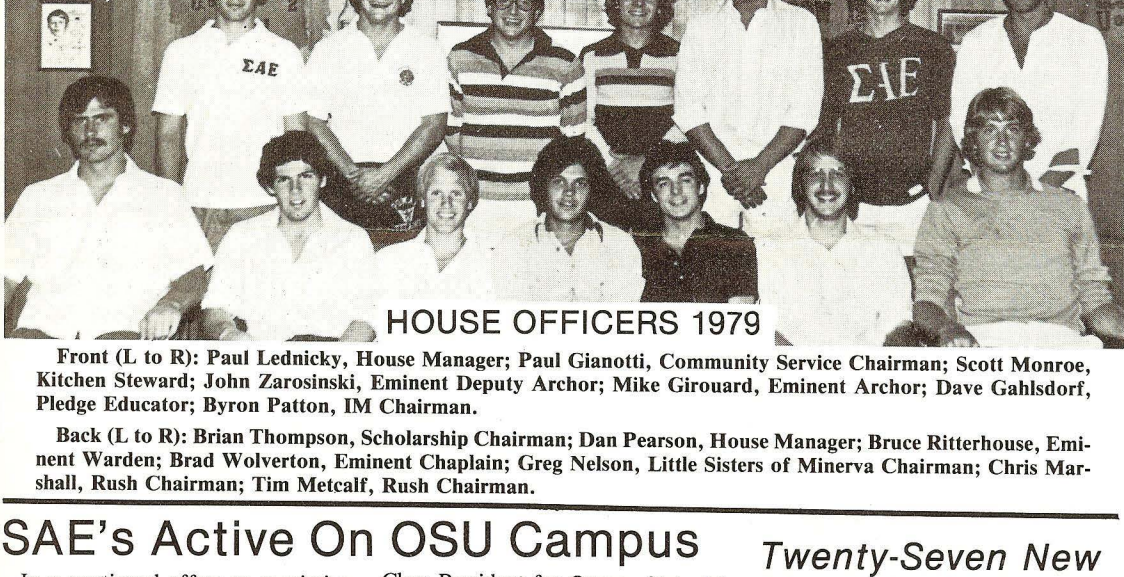

A number of brothers were involved in one or more campus activities. Many freshmen have also interviewed for both A.S.O.U.S. and I.F.C. committee positions and are awaiting their appointments.

This spring term, Jeff Mengis, '81, was elected Senator for the School of Business. Jeff is also a member of the following organizations: Board of Physical Recreation, Student Government Committee, Appropriations and Budget Committee, Business Student Council, and OSU water polo.

Past Eminent Archon, Dan Roth, '79, has been a member of the IFC Judicial Committee this past year and was elected President of Blue Key, a society composed of outstanding leaders on campus. Dan has been active in IFC all four years here at OSU and has contributed much to the honor of this house. Letter From The Assistant Dean Of Students

When Dick Thompson, editor of the Oregon Alpha News, invited me to submit the following remarks, I was delighted. It was the first time in my 13 years as adviser to fraternities at Oregon State University that I had been invited to do so. I was beginning to wonder if you would ever ask! I am also pleased as this represents an opportunity to thank the many alumni who have contributed so much service and support to me, the fraternity, and to Oregon State University throughout Oregon Alpha's 64 years.

There have been many positive changes throughout the fraternity system during the past five years, not the least of which has been the increasing numbers and renewed interest in fraternities at Oregon State. Oregon Alpha was not affected by the severe decline in the late 60's and early 70's to the same extent as other chapters. This was due in part to the support, interest, and involvement of certain alumni who helped preserve and maintain some of the original values and principles of the fraternity and provided direction for it. Regrettably, this has not always been true for other chapters. I am pleased to indicate that this past year, there was an increase of 8 percent in the number of men pledging fraternities during the fall formal rush. Needless to say, we hope that this "increasing" trend continues as it seems to have throughout the country. Movies such as "Animal House" have not had the detrimental impact that some had anticipated.

The University continues to be supportive of the fraternity program, although it must from time to time challenge the direction of the fraternities to be sure they remain worthwhile and contributing members of the academic community. A recent concern on the part of the University is that for the past several years, the grade point average of men in fraternities has been below the all-men's undergraduate average. It is important that residence in any fraternity (as well as Oregon Alpha) represents more than simply having a "good time," and that living in the chapter helps to contribute rather than detract from one's chances of academic success at the University. From my visits to the chapter, I can still feel the presence of fraternity — you know, the things that you and I valued so much from our experience. Things like friendship, pride, learning to live and work with people with diverse backgrounds and interests, sharing the good times with the bad — these all continue to be as important a part of the chapter and the fraternity experience at Oregon State today as they were for us!

I take this opportunity to say "hello" to the many fellow SAE's — alumni and students — with whom I have worked these past 13 years. Also, I and my predecessors — Dick Pahre, now director of Financial Aid at OSU,

and Dean Dan Poling, formerly Dean of Men and now retired and living in the Corvallis area — extend our warmest regards.

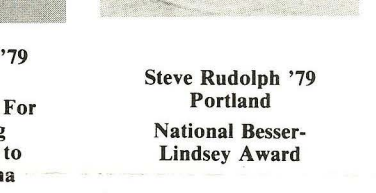

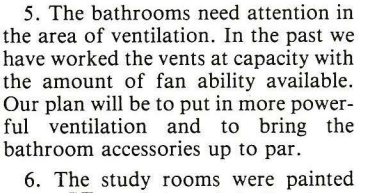

Building Association Report

The 'new' house is twenty years old and at our last association meeting the decision was made to start a five year renovation program spending in the vicinity of between \$25,000.00 and \$30,000.00. Burke Hayes will chair this undertaking and Don Hector and myself be on hand to help. No priority list has been prepared as yet, but things to be done are as follows:

1. New draperies and counter tops in the kitchen with the possibility of tile on the walls. With the new dishwasher last this would bring it up to A-1 condition.
2. New draperies and carpet in the living room and recovering of the present furniture. The leather pieces are still in good condition.
3. Replace the floor tile in the dining room and of course the long overdue new chairs. However, those old chairs are sturdy and will be used in the study rooms. Also, the dining room

tables need some minor repairs, but all in all are in really good shape and are ready for another 20 years of rugged service.

4. New carpeting in the den and halls is also on the eventual list.

5. The bathrooms need attention in the area of ventilation. In the past we have worked the vents at capacity with the amount of fan ability available. Our plan will be to put in more powerful ventilation and to bring the bathroom accessories up to par.

6. The study rooms were painted last year but need repair in the closets (the folding doors have been a problem since the house was constructed), and the study desks themselves need refinishing.

7. The sleeping porches always need attention with doors, smoke alarms, walls, etc. In the main the beds and mattresses are in good shape.

8. The dining seems to be OK and with its annual check-up works well.

Inflation is our number one enemy and we could be off in our estimate of cost, but since Brother Ben was able to get the mortgage paid off early (18 yrs.) we have funds going into our building improvement program from the rent we receive from the active chapter. This plus our voluntary dues program from all of you (this amounts to a little over \$2,000.00 per year net) we have some flexibility.

All in all we have had another great year. SAE remains the top house on the campus and these young men individually are outstanding in each in their own way. I know they sincerely enjoy a visit from their alumni and believe it or not this does not happen often. They see some of our faces around here, but would truly like to see some new ones.

The new SAE director is about to go to press and hopefully will be out by the fall.

SAE's Participate In Varsity Athletics

OSU's varsity football team was fortunate enough to have five brothers of Oregon Alpha represented on the grid iron last fall.

Making his final year with the Beavers' last fall as an offensive lineman, Todd will be heard from in the past few years. Lenny was selected as a SAE All-American in 1978. He also represented OSU in the Hula Bowl, while receiving PAC-10 honorable mention honors, and the Beavers "Most Inspirational Player" award. It was a fired up Lenny who led the Orange and Black defense to a 15-13 upset over UGA in the Homecoming game last November with 11 tackles.

Causing a crucial fumble which led to the Beavers only touchdown in the season game was defensive end, Bob Westerberb '81. Nick led the defense steadily throughout the past season, and with an offer from the Cincinnati Bengals currently under his belt, he is considered by many to be an excellent pro prospect.

Also seeing plenty of action was Darren Knopp '81. Coach Craig Fertig used Darren on both offense and defense before a knee injury sidelined him midway through the season. Darren has been working steadily on the knee and should be back in the line up next fall.

Todd Knopp, '82, a freshman from Pendleton saw some action for the Beavers last fall as an offensive lineman. Todd will be heard from in the Beaver line-up for years to come as he's still growing.

Coaching the Beaver J.V. Basketball Team, Daryl Kitt, '79, received excellent performance from brothers Curt Spiving, '81, and Billy Patton, '82. Billy led the undersized Beavers in scoring while Curt proved to be the most consistent all-around performer for the team.

OSU's diamond men were again led by a number of SAE's. Highlighting the Beaver offense was Steve Rudolph, '79, and Dan Pearson, '80. "Rudy's" big stick roared this spring; in several games, he had three or four hits. Not known as a power hitter, he surprised everyone with a few homers as well. Steve also combined with Dan against the University of Puget Sound to set an OSU record. Each had three

doubles and four hits in that game. Steve will be sorely missed next year as his four years have come to a close, but Brother Coach will be depended on heavily by Coach Jack Riley to provide offense and leadership in the next campaign.

After shattering several OSU hitting records last year as a freshman, Bob McNair, '81, went into a slump at the plate this year. He did manage to hit a few home runs, including a three-run shot in the bottom of the ninth to beat Linfield. We are looking for "Bobbo" to rebound for a strong performance next year for the Beavers.

In wrestling, Mark Evenhus, '79, PAC-8 champion last year, had another strong season for Dale Thomas' grapplers. Mark finished high enough in the PAC-10 to advance to the NCAA Championships where he completed his season ranked 7th in the nation.
