Leaders Guide Chapter Through COVID-19 and Re-opening



After 15 months of observing COVID protocols, our Oregon Alpha House Corporation is proud to recognize our chapter leaders, led by EA's Alex Matot '21, Cody Fretwell '22, and Jack Imelio '21 (pictured above L-R) and EDA Jacob Leavitt '22, for their dedication to keeping the chapter safe and compliant with University and Benton County guidelines.

As you may recall, the House Corporation, with input from Oregon State's Center for Fraternity and Sorority Life and Benton County Health officials, made the difficult decision in March 2020 to shutter the house for spring quarter. To this day we stand by this decision, as painful as it was to make.

The chapter's Executive Committee formed a "COVID Team" last summer, as recommended by our SAE National Office, and in collaboration with our House Corporation Board came up with some detailed and specific instructions for re-opening the fraternity during the fall of 2020. Many sacrifices were made in the name of health, safety, and compliance with University and County protocols.

During fall term 2020, only 24 brothers lived in the house. This number grew to 28 for winter quarter, and 44 lived in this past spring. These reduced numbers enabled chapter leaders to maintain social distancing and certainly less crowded sleeping porches. The house received extra sanitation and additional professional cleaning each week during this past academic year.

We look forward to seeing a full house in fall 2021, and a robust recruitment effort to bring in the best young men from around the state and the country. Once again, a huge "tip of the hat" to our Executive Leadership Team for the great job they did leading their brothers through this most unprecedented time!

EA Report: Record Success in Recruitment, Philanthropy

As you can imagine, this past year has been anything but ordinary. After being sent home following winter term 2020 due to COVID-19, everyone was unsure what the 2020-21 school year would hold. Would all classes continue online? Would we be allowed to return to campus? There was so much uncertainty. So when the University announced that students were finally permitted back on campus grounds, our chapter leadership

team, lead by Jack Imelio '21 and Alex Matot '21, worked with our Housing Corporation to create and implement COVID-19 protocols. These protocols led us to re-open the chapter house last September.

This past fall term brought many challenges as we sought to return to normal activities. However, there were just as many victories. Jake Leavitt '22 and Jacob Howell '22 recruited 42 students, creating the largest new-member class of all the fraternities at Oregon State.

Another significant victory was successfully negotiating with our House Corporation to allow more members to move into Oregon Alpha and to re-open our basketball court. We started the year with only 24 members living in. This number eventually grew to 44 by the end of the year, with 6 Juniors, 12 Sophomores, and 26 Freshmen. I know that may not seem like many to those of you who have lived in our beautiful chapter house before, but to us, it truly made all the difference in the world. As soon as the extra 17 members moved into the house, and other members were allowed to gather and play basketball on Moe Court, there was an immediate boost in chapter morale and brotherhood amongst all 127 members.

Rylan Fancher '23 and Cade Dinsmore '23 were responsible for our most notable victory. Thanks to them, last winter term we hosted a philanthropy event for the Mario Pastega House in Corvallis. This event ended up being the most significant philanthropy event hosted by any Sigma Alpha Epsilon chapter across the country. It involved a T-shirt design contest that quickly became incredibly competitive among the sororities. We raised \$7,500 in donations. Through matching funds, including the Pastega Foundation, a grand total of \$30,000 was donated to the Pastega House, which serves patients and families who must travel to Corvallis for specialty medical care.

Through the trials and tribulations of this year, Oregon Alpha excelled due to solid leadership and the effort these young men have put forth. I am very proud of the success we have had over this past year, and look forward to another strong year ahead.

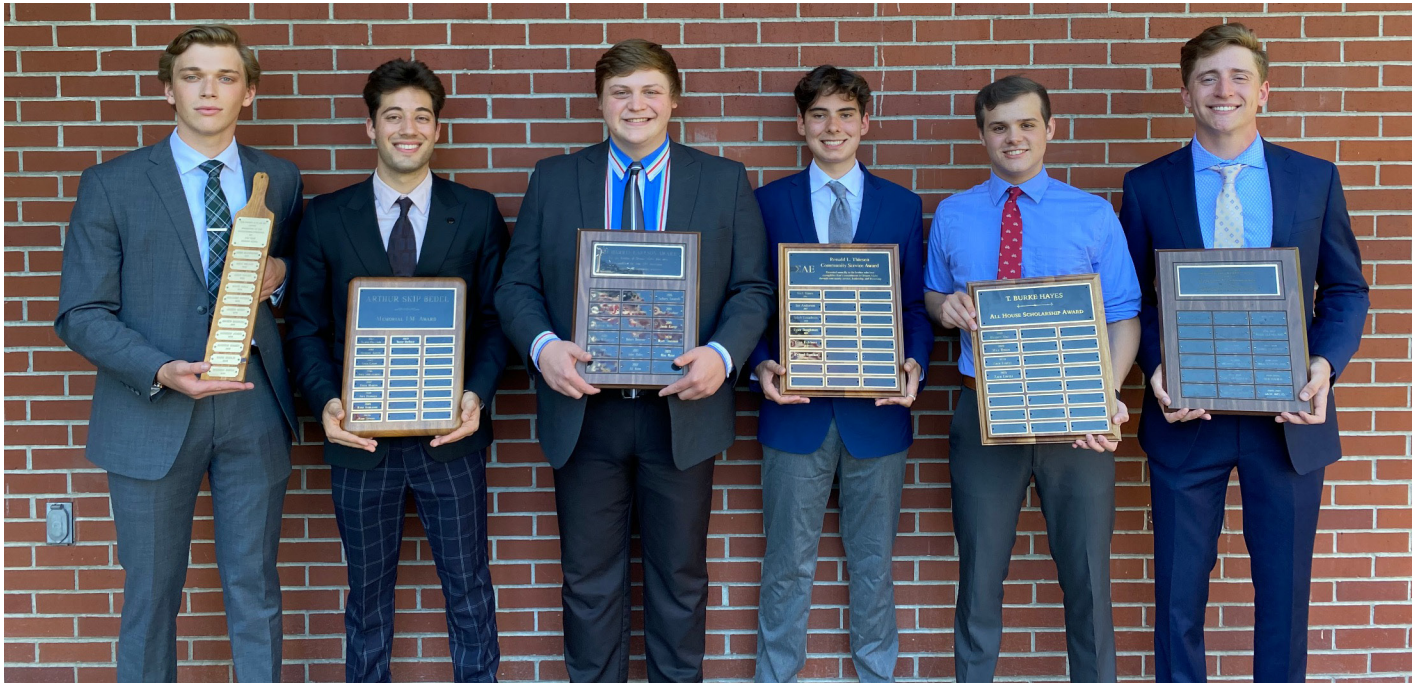

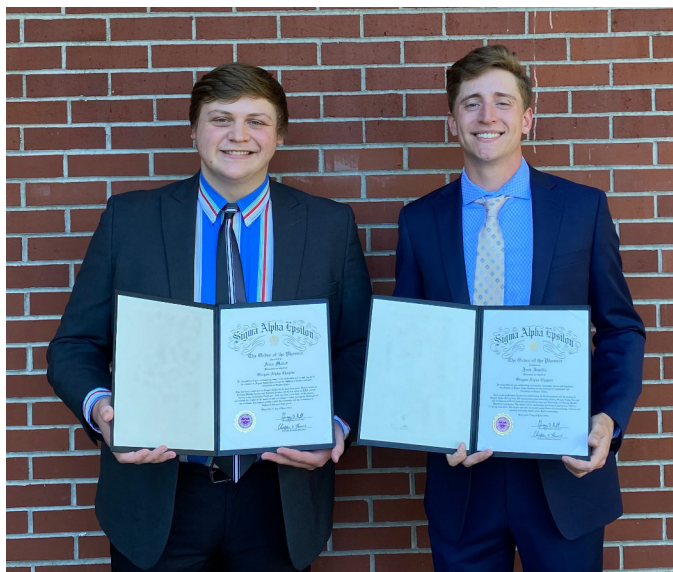
Oregon Alpha Annual Awards Winners, May 17, 2021

Oregon Alpha continues to be blessed to have Stro Strohmeyer's dedication, service, and leadership as House Dad. This year marks fifteen years of commitment to building brotherhood at Oregon Alpha.

Stro started at Oregon Alpha in the fall of 2006 and became an honor initiate in Sigma Alpha Epsilon on April 20, 2008. Being a house dad

for over 600 members is certainly a unique experience. Stro's observations, gleaned from his time with the chapter, are as follows:

Fifteen Things I've Learned Over Fifteen Years as SAE House Dad

1. When young men first walk through our doors, they know very little about fraternity life. To them, everything they do has never been done before. I've seen it a hundred times but with an occasional twist to keep things interesting.

2. I never consider myself to be the smartest guy in the room. Today's students, with their immediate access to information, are incredibly bright.

3. Most young adult males do not develop the ability to make rational decisions until after the age of 23. This explains fraternity life of Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights.

4. I am usually the only adult in the room, which provides me with a bit of credibility.

5. Unless you're a fraternity man, you can't imagine. I have seen things, heard things, and smelled things most adults would find disgusting.

6. I don't yell at the guys as much as I did in earlier years. If I want to get their attention, I just bring up sex, drugs, and alcohol. They find it amusing when an old guy talks about sex, drugs, and alcohol.

7. We have had ten different cooks since the retirement of our legendary chef Mitchell Culbertson. Not one of them was able to figure out the eating habits of a fraternity man. Rule #1: You can never serve too much meat.

8. I have been here when we have had 24 guys in the house and when we've had 72 guys in the house. The energy of a full house creates a dynamic image that will be etched into their memories forever.

9. There is a chaotic order to the chapter. I can tell a great deal about the mood of things based on noise levels and movement.

10. The chapter functions more smoothly when everyone has a job to do and they do their jobs well.

11. When moms visit the house, they appreciate the smell of bleach.

12. When alumni visit the house, they appreciate that the house smells the same as when they lived here.

13. Living at SAE gives me a built-in excuse should I do something questionable in public. I just say, "Well, what do you expect, I live in a fraternity."

14. I have never seen a pandemic before, and I hope to never see one again. We had 99% of the guys test positive, and yet I was somehow spared. The house remained operational for a full year and the guys learned how to lead in a crisis.

15. Not every man can be a fraternity man and not every fraternity man can be an SAE. This is the way it should be. I am grateful for SAE. For a job well done, a yard well kept, and for all the brothers who have shared with me this most unusual experience.

SAE 165th Anniversary Convention Held in Des Moines, Iowa

This past July 15-17, the Host Committee for the 165th Anniversary Convention welcomed more than 400 members and guests to the capital city of Des Moines, Iowa, for the biennial meeting of Brothers from across our Realm. Thursday included board meetings and an official welcoming reception as well as Supreme Council candidate campaigning. Friday focused on the election of the Supreme Council and an evening trip to Smashpark, a local games and fun center. Saturday was dedicated to fraternity law proposals, the awards luncheon, and the evening closing banquet. Members celebrated our new Supreme Council, deliberations completed, and expectations for a bright fraternal future in Sigma Alpha Epsilon. ESR Chris Hancock and the Supreme Council reviewed the following goals and fraternity focus for 2025:

- # 1 - GROWTH: By 2025, SAE will have 250 active chapters and consortiums made up of 15,000 collegiate members.
- # 2 - COMMUNICATIONS: By 2025, SAE will add 16,000 members to our social media platforms and 10,000 alumni members will subscribe to *The Record*.
- # 3 - ALUMNI ENGAGEMENT: By 2025, SAE will have 200 active alumni associations and alumni affiliate groups, and include 10,000 engaged alumni.
- # 4 - SCHOLARSHIP: By 2025, all SAE chapters/colonies will rank above their all-campus average in GPA, and will rank # 1 in GPA among fraternities on their campuses.
- # 5 - LEADERSHIP: By 2025, 8,500 collegiate members will participate in our leadership programs (including a new leadership model and return of our Leadership School in 2022).
- # 6 - SERVICE: By 2025, SAE will complete one million hours of service and will raise one million dollars in philanthropic support.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon will hold its 167th Anniversary Convention in St. Louis, Missouri, in 2023.
