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HOME OF ... ORE. ALPHA

Established as a land grant institution in 1868, Oregon State College is the oldest and largest school of higher education in Oregon. The college is located in Corvallis, (population 15,000) situated in the heart of the beautiful Willamette Valley, 85 miles south of Portland. The campus proper covers 199 acres and includes schools of Engineering, Business and Technology, Agriculture, Home Economics, Education, Forestry, Pharmacy, and Science. The 1948-1949 enrollment is approximately 7,500 full-time students.

Oregon State offers a complete and escellently organized intercollegiate athletic program under the supervision of athletic director R. S. "Spec" Keene. Varsity coaches of the major sports include "Kip" Taylor, football; "Slats" Gill, basketball; Ralph Coleman, baseball; Grant Swan, track; Reg Flood, swimming; Bob "Rapid Robert" Antonacci, wrestling; and Irwin Harris, tennis. Another sport that is gaining in popularity is crew which is under the direction of Coach Stephens, a one time Harvard oarsman and coach.

The recent building expansion program has brought to the campus a new Electrical Engineering building and an ultra modern women's dormitory. Now under construction is a million dollar basketball pavilion which will seat over 10,000 fans. A new turf football field was installed last summer and plans are being made for a new stadium. These improvements will give Oregon State one of the finest athletic plants in the Pacific Northwest.

The Oregon State Campus is the home of 28 fraternities and 16 sororities, all of them national organizations. The fraternity system at Oregon State is an integral part of the school which is under the direction of Dr. A. L. Strand, Montana Alpha. Oregon Alpha of Sigma Alpha Epsilon received its charter in 1914 and is the oldest fraternity on the campus.

Speed has another project in the hobby room and work shop now under construction. Though primarily built as a place to keep tools, it can be used for repairing skis, making posters for Homecoming signs, or as a general work shop. A hobby room has been needed for a long time.

Last summer saw the building of cement curbings along the south entrance to the parking lot. Labor was supplied by members and pledges who attended summer school. The driveway was surfaced with black top early last fall.



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


THE HOUSE - in a winter setting






