Our first concern was to shape up the grass with frequent cutting and regular watering to offset the early hot weather. Weeding the Bar Harbor Juniper on the bank with ultimate replacement of several that had failed to live along with a good rototilling and a final barkdust mulch soon changed the outside appearances for the better.

Both the recreation and chapter rooms received a fresh coat of paint in a new fern color along with new drapes in each. Needed repairs to the kitchen steel table and silverware drawers were ac-complished as well as thorough cleaning of the gas range and exhaust fans and ducts. Touch up painting and varnishing in the kitchen will make it just that much easier to clean.

The housemother quarters walls and ceiling were washed and cleaned while the rugs received the annual shampooing. This was in preparation for occupancy of the new housemother, Mrs. Lucas.

Two new water faucets were installed along the parking area by the implement shed to facilitate car washing by the members. This was necessary in order to find room for some 7 or 8 of our football brothers who were given the gate at the Coliseum about

10 days early. Most of the repair work had been accomplished so this move presented no particular problem but that might not always be the case. In conclusion, we might add that we had more "thank yous" this year from the actives than we can remember and of course that always helps.
